

# N5 ENGLISH ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

<p><b>What is the course content at National 5?</b></p> <p>The National 5 English course is divided up into Analysis and Evaluation, and Creation and Production. All elements of the course are designed to complement each other. FINAL EXAM:	<b>Reading for Understanding, Analysis and Evaluation (RUAЕ)</b> Pupils will be given an unseen newspaper article of around a page and half in length, and a set of questions (usually 9) testing their UAE skills	1 hour	30	30%
	<b>Critical Reading -</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Scottish Set Text (20 marks) – 12 marks of analysis questions on a poem or extract from longer text + 8 mark commonality question</li> <li>• Critical Essay (20 marks) – a choice of two essay questions per genre, on a text studied in class</li> </ul>	1 hour 30 minutes	40	40%
COURSEWORK:	<b>Folio of Writing</b> Reduced in the past few years from a requirement for two pieces, to one. Pupils to submit an essay which is either broadly discursive or broadly creative. Max word limit is 1000, recommended minimum of 800.	ONGOING (SQA UPLIFT IN MARCH)	15	30% (Folio score X2)

<p><b>Tips for Successful Revision</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Know your texts well – re-read/watch any longer texts and ensure you have detailed notes about aspects such as plot, characterisation, setting, theme etc.</li> <li>• Spend time with past papers and look for patterns recurring with essay questions and 8-mark questions to help you prepare.</li> <li>• Produce mind-maps of commonalities and consider which quotes (textual evidence) you will need to support different questions.</li> <li>• In learning quotes for paper 2, try to learn quotes which are multi-purpose – can be used as evidence for more than one commonality or aspect of essay.</li> <li>• For critical essay prep, writing out lots of essays is inefficient, but you should practise planning.</li> <li>• Practise with RUAЕ past papers and revise recommended analysis structures.</li> </ul>	<p><b>Tips for Success in the Exam</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Candidates are <i>not</i> marked down for spelling/grammar errors in RUAЕ and Scottish Text – this can cause some anxiety with dyslexic learners – don't fret about this in those exam elements, as that takes up time and headspace.</li> <li>• Use highlighters to pick out key words in questions, and examples in texts you are analysing – cuts down time when checking your answers against passages.</li> <li>• Read the whole RUAЕ passage before you start questions.</li> <li>• Cast your eye down the marks column before starting so you know where the higher tariff questions fall – improves pace/time management in exam.</li> <li>• Stick strictly to line references in RUAЕ and Set Text.</li> <li>• Manage your time well – in Critical Reading, you should switch tasks at 45 minutes – it's better to finish the essay than the set text, if time is running out.</li> <li>• REMEMBER – at N5 you get marks for quoting, so make sure you get quotes in if time running out, even if you don't have time to analyse them.</li> <li>• Pay close attention to how many marks are available in each question.</li> <li>• Critical Reading - only answer on the set text you have studied and write one essay in the correct genre category – should be a different genre to set text.</li> <li>• Use recommended bullet pointed structures for short response answers.</li> </ul>
